GETTING YOUR CHILD READY TO LEARN

- Read to your child daily and talk about the story before, during and after you read. Ask them to point out a certain letter or familiar word they might know.
- Sing an alphabet song, point out letters and words you see around you in the world and help them try to print letters on their own.
- You can help your child practice printing their name (capital for the first letter and lowercase for the rest).
- Play games looking for numbers in their world and count toys or objects.
- Practice using glue, scissors and coloring materials before they use them at school.

GETTING YOUR CHILD READY FOR SCHOOL

- ✓ Shoes: If possible, your child should have sneakers for indoor use/gym class (preferably slip-on or with velcro straps so your child can take them off/put on easily). They should be labelled with your child's name.
- ✓ Send in <u>spare clothes</u> for your child. Place the clothing in a baggie with your child's name on the bag.
- ✓ Practice <u>independent dressing</u> skills like zippers, snaps and changing shoes.
- ✓ Help your child learn how to use a <u>public</u> <u>bathroom</u> (i.e. how to work stall door locks, flush toilets and hand washing.
- ✓ Talk to your child about what is packed for <u>lunch</u> and <u>snack</u>, so they know the difference.
- ✓ We are a peanut and treenut free school.
- ✓ Have students practice opening and closing lunch/snack containers and packages.
- ✓ Discuss your child's <u>afterschool routine</u> with them. We'll gather more information in September.
- ✓ <u>School bags</u> should fit their lunch bag, their message bag, and a change of clothes.

Please label all belongings-book bags, coats, shoes, hats, sweaters, etc.
Unclaimed items will 'be added to a Lost and Found area.

There are a variety of ways to communicate between home and school.

- Newsletters and memos sent home regularly from the classroom and school to help keep you informed.
- Events throughout the year (i.e. Curriculum Night, report cards, school events).

It is important to check the home and school message bag and empty your child's backpack every day. If you can, get your child to participate. This will help develop and practice routines which they will gradually become responsible for.
